Embarking on Our Centennial Restoration Journey

As we approach a remarkable milestone—100 years of the Harrison Memorial Library—we are thrilled to embark on the first steps of a significant centennial restoration project in partnership with the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea and the Library. The goal is to complete the project in time for the library's Centennial

birthday in 2028. This ambitious endeavor aligns with our mission to ensure the library remains open, relevant, and thriving for generations to come.

This restoration marks the first comprehensive interior restoration of the 7,300-square-foot facility in nearly a century, ensuring its historical and cultural significance. In 2022/23 the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea commissioned a master plan study to assess the library's condition. The study revealed the critical need to upgrade systems including seismic and electrical, energy efficiencies as well as universal accessibility.

The Harrison Memorial Library has long been a cornerstone of our community, providing a welcoming space for learning, connection, and inspiration. As we prepare to honor its legacy, our restoration efforts will focus on preserving the building's historic charm while enhancing its functionality to meet the evolving needs of our patrons.

Additionally, infrastructure upgrades will ensure the building is universally accessible. This is a big undertaking, and with the continued support of our dedicated donors and community partners, we are dedicated to helping achieve this goal.

While we take on this important project, we remain steadfast in our support of the library's ongoing programs. Our efforts to provide exceptional resources and programming continue, and we invite you to join us in celebrating our shared love of literature at our annual event with acclaimed author Susan Orlean on April 22nd. This special evening promises to be an inspiring gathering for book lovers and library supporters alike.

We extend our deepest gratitude to our donors, whose generosity makes all of this possible. Your unwavering support allows us to preserve our beloved library's legacy while ensuring its future remains bright and accessible to all.

Celebrating Local History

The Henry Meade Williams Local History Lecture Series has been a cornerstone of our library foundation community programs, bringing together residents of all ages to explore and preserve our shared heritage. Over the past year, the programs aptly themed *A Sense of Place – Profiles from the Collection* shared archival treasures including; rare photographs, letters, and documents and provided insightful lectures about Carmel's remarkable ancestors.

These programs and rotating exhibits have drawn record attendance and sparked lively conversations. Through these efforts, the Henry Meade Local History Lecture Series has not only preserved priceless memories but also fostered a sense of pride and belonging among residents.

Restoring a Treasure

Parallel to the success of the local history programs is the inspiring progress of the Harrison Memorial Library Centennial Restoration . Our historic library, originally built in 1928, is poised to undergo a thoughtful restoration and renovation to preserve its architectural beauty while updating it for the needs of today's and tomorrow's users. This project will be made possible through private funds raised by the Carmel Public Library Foundation, and a collaboration between the Foundation and the City of Carmel.




The Library Remains a Constant

- Architectural Preservation: The original 1928 Harrison Memorial Library designed by Bernard Maybeck and built by M.J. Murphy will be carefully and sensitively restored, ensuring the library retains its iconic aesthetics and historic charm.
- Critical Infrastructure Updates: Including seismic, electrical, universal accessibility, state-of-the-art technology, healthy and energy-efficient systems and more.






Inspiring Generations


