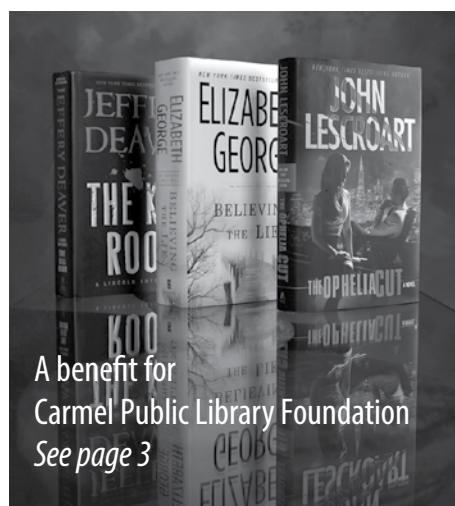
Our Former Board Directors and Life Members

About the Authors

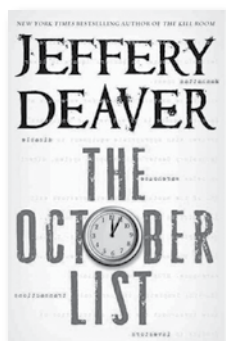

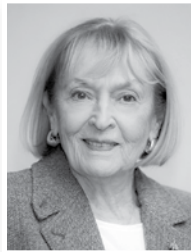

EASY & SIMPLE! Make an IRA Charitable Rollover Gift — *available until January 1, 2014!*

The IRA Charitable Rollover has been reinstated. This provision makes it possible for donors ages 70.5 and older to make tax-free charitable gifts directly from a traditional IRA to an eligible charitable organization like the Carmel Public Library Foundation. The provision has a cap of \$100,000. Individuals may exclude the amount distributed directly to an eligible charity from their gross income. This provision is still time-limited and applies to qualified charitable distributions made before January 1, 2014. 🌀
