COMMUNITY INPUT SUMMARY

Executive Summary

On November 10, 2025, Carmel-by-the-Sea's dedicated library community gathered for the third time to hear about the evolution of the Harrison Memorial Library project and share their thoughts in a highly participatory community focused workshop. The workshop was hosted by the City of Carmel-by-the-Sea, the Carmel Public Library, and the Carmel Public Library Foundation, to provide critical input for the library's Centennial Restoration Project. The project is being funded by donors through a Carmel Public Library Foundation capital campaign. It will provide much needed improvements to the historic building, enabling the library to continue its vital role as a center for the community for the next 100-years.

The goal of the workshop was to keep the community informed on the progress of the project and solicit input on the evolution of the proposed conceptual approach to the project.

The workshop began with a summary of key themes and ideas that emerged from the prior workshops,

- the importance of the library's historic charm and character,
- the need for an accessible, inclusive, and welcoming environment
- the critical nature of books and research as core to the library experience,
- the library as a community and cultural center,
- and the desire for flexibility to accommodate changing needs and new technology.

A review of the historic evaluation of the building highlighted key elements that define the character from the original 1928 design.

Concurrent technical evaluations outlined conceptual approaches to address the building's accessibility challenges, improve seismic safety, and provide a more resilient and energy efficient building within the framework of the historic structure.

Executive Summary (cont'd)

A refined approach to the development of the restoration was shared with the workshop participants. This conceptual approach was developed to balance the preservation of the library's historic charm and the evolving needs for the future of libraries within an achievable budget and timeline. It incorporated critical input from library staff, patrons, the city, and library foundation, with aspirations and ideas shared by the broader community, including.

- · restore the original character,
- celebrate books while increasing types of seating and gathering,
- preserve the feel of the library with in-wall shelving,
- · provide flexible and reconfigurable spaces,
- integrate emerging technology,
- optimize outdoor space for library functions

Community input at the third workshop focused on imagining the newly restored library in 2028, after it has reopened. The community shared ideas on how they would use the library, along with the types of collaborative activities and events they would like to see at the library.

Key themes reinforced that the library's future lies in balancing tradition with innovation. By restoring historic elements, expanding technological capabilities, and deepening community engagement, the library will continue to thrive as a vital institution, not only as a repository of knowledge but as a living, breathing center of civic life




