


Reggie Jackson brings fans out with new book

Reggie Jackson is not only a Hall-of-Fame baseball player, but he proved to be a Hall-of-Fame guide and mentor for all the young people who were in attendance at our Arts and Literary event this past January. Reggie appeared as the co-author of a new book on inside baseball entitled Sixty Feet Six Inches (which is the distance from the pitcher's mound to home plate). Jackson entertained and enlightened a packed house at Carpenter Hall. Although baseball was the principal subject, Reggie was inspirational in talking to the many young people who were hanging on his every word.

Peter Mollman, President of Carmel Public Library Foundation, hosted the event. There were cookies in the shape of baseballs and boxes of Cracker Jacks, and Jackson passed around the room his World Series diamond-studded rings. Proceeds benefit Harrison Memorial Library.

Jackson talked about growing up poor in Philadelphia and about



playing in the minor leagues in the South during the 1960s. He talked about what it was like to give back something to his parents who worked so hard to support his career. He told all the kids that their parents were the most important people in their lives.

He shared baseball statistics with local baseball fans, from youngsters who never saw him play to those who followed his every career move. All evening, Jackson demonstrated that he is


